Slow Down, Drive Safely to Protect Workers

Orange cones, warning signs, and flashing lights all indicate a work zone on the road ahead.

Within these zones are men and women doing their jobs. Unfortunately, hundreds of these workers are injured every year from work and road hazards. Some are even killed.

Rock Energy Cooperative urges motorists to slow down and pay attention while driving in work zones.

Violating traffic laws in these zones can lead to hefty fines or even jail time.

When the power goes out, so do our line crews. Our workers are the first to respond after an outage occurs, and they work tirelessly until power is restored to all members.

Our natural gas crews frequently work along streets and roads when installing or replacing gas lines, investigating gas calls, or performing our annual leak survey.

Power poles and natural gas pipes line our streets and highways. Narrow roads often require crews to place their equipment in traffic lanes.

If you're traveling and see

one of our crews on the side of the road or street, we kindly ask that you move over if possible and give them a little extra space to work.

We deeply care about the safety of all, and this extra precaution ensures just that.

If you approach a crew while traveling on a two-lane road, moving over to the next lane might not be an option. In this case, we simply ask that you slow down.

If you're driving on a fourlane road and safety and traffic conditions allow, we ask that you move over into the far lane

Electric and natural gas crews aren't the only ones who could use the extra space. Police officers, firefighters, and emergency medical technicians often find themselves responding to emergency situations near busy roads.

Don't make the jobs of electric and natural gas crews, tree trimmers, road workers, and others more dangerous. Like everyone, they deserve a safe workplace. Let's work together to protect everyone by driving safely.



If you see police, firefighters, utility crews, or other emergency personnel on the side of the road, please slow down and move over when possible. Together we can keep crews safe.

Work Zone Safety Tips

Safe Electricity, a program of the Energy Education Council, recommends the following guidelines while driving to help prevent injuries and fatalities in work zones.

- Keep a safe distance between your vehicle and traffic barriers, trucks, construction equipment, and workers.
- Be patient. Traffic delays are sometimes unavoidable, so try to allow time for unexpected occurrences in your schedule.
 - Obey all signs and road crew flag instructions.
 - Merge early and be courteous to other drivers.
 - Use your headlights at dusk and during bad weather.
- Avoid distracting activities like operating a radio or eating while driving.
 - And definitely don't text behind the wheel.
