



An Energy Efficiency Program

for Rock Energy Cooperative members

Rock Energy members who live in Illinois are eligible for rebates of up to \$1,500 when they make specific energy efficiency improvements to their homes.

How much are the rebates?*

Geothermal heat pumps	\$1,500
Air-source heat pumps	\$1,000
Central air conditioning	\$350
Natural gas or LP furnace	\$350
Heat pump water heater	\$250
Insulation/air sealing	\$500 maximum, 30% of project cost

*Rebates will be approved for only one piece of heating or cooling equipment

How does the program work?

1. Call Rock Energy at (866) 752-4550 to arrange an energy assessment, which is required to qualify for the rebates. Appointments will be scheduled between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. A \$25 fee will be collected at the time of the in-home assessment.
2. You will receive recommendations about how to improve your home's energy efficiency, performance and comfort.
3. Decide what work will be completed and submit a proposal and cost estimate to us. We will return a signed copy, stating that funds have been set aside for you.
4. Work must be completed within 60 days.
5. Send us a completion form with copies of your receipts.
6. We will issue a check to you.

More Power to You

History Takes Center Stage at 75th Anniversary Celebration

There's a saying—"We honor ourselves by honoring our past"—and that's exactly what happened on March 28 when more than 700 Rock Energy Cooperative members, guests, friends, and employees gathered at the Eclipse Center in Beloit for the co-op's 75th Annual Meeting and Anniversary Celebration.

Thanks to everyone who attended and helped make the evening memorable. I believe the forward-thinking men who founded Rock County Electric Cooperative Association on April 23, 1936, and other people who were involved in the cooperative movement through the years were with us in spirit as we took a stroll down memory lane.

It's astounding when you consider the changes that have occurred in the co-op's history. Rock County Electric Cooperative started in 1936 with a couple hundred meters. We have 27,000 today. The number of employees grew from four to more than 50 today. We have changed our name, expanded our service territory to include urban

areas as well as the rural countryside, and now also deliver natural gas to our Illinois members.

Technology has changed the way we do business. Modern equipment has allowed us to increase our efficiency. Most of our meters are now read remotely, and thankfully we have fewer and shorter outages than in the old days.

Financially, the co-op is strong. Our annual revenue increased from \$50,000 in the early years to more than \$50 million today, and we have returned more than \$9.6 million in capital credits to our members over the years.

Those are significant changes. But many things haven't changed since 1936. The co-op still exists for you—our members. The board and employees continue their dedication to providing outstanding service. Our members continue to have a financial interest in the co-op and partici-

part in the governance of the co-op through the election process. And we continue to give back to the communities we serve.

This was my 11th annual meeting at Rock Energy, but many in attendance had been to 30 or 40 or more of these events over the years. That really says something about our organization and the way we do business. The cooperative business model—one that focuses on the member first—continues to thrive after 75 years.

No matter what era we live in, there always are challenges. Like in 1936, when the co-op was founded, we have many that lie ahead. But today's concerns are different. Back in 1936, the challenges focused on setting an electric pole by hand and the other difficulties of getting electricity to rural areas. Today, the country's energy policy and climate change legislation are the big issues. Whatever the future holds, I assure you that Rock Energy will always put the members' needs first.

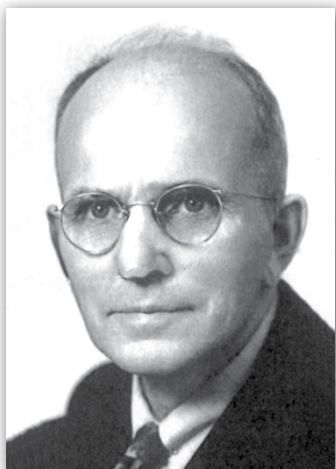


75th Anniversary Celebration

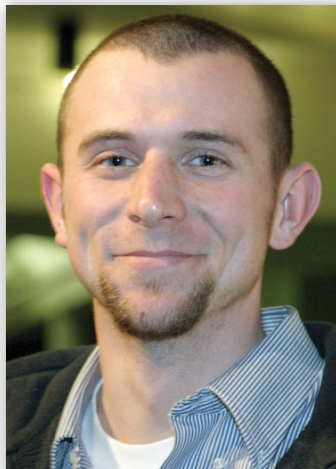
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Because we celebrated our 75th anniversary at this annual meeting, history took center stage. We showed a 20-minute video that highlighted the co-op's early days and how it has grown through the years. We were fortunate to have several special guests from the co-op's past attend the meeting. Nine descendants of J.O. Woodman were recognized. On July 15, 1937, the J.O. Woodman farm in La Prairie Township was the first on our co-op lines to get energy, largely because of J.O.'s efforts to recruit members to join the co-op. In attendance were J.O.'s grandson Robert and his wife,

Jane; his granddaughter Nancy and her husband, Don Guse; his granddaughter Joan and her husband, Charles Hegg; his great-grandson Bob and his wife, Vicki; and his great-great grandson Joseph, who operates the farm today.

Also recognized at the meeting were Sandi Torkilsson Hargraves, Miss Rock County REA from 1971 who went on to become the state and national winner, and Julie Engen Rumage, Miss Rock County REA from 1972.

But the annual meeting wasn't all about history. We also had some business to conduct. Director Bill Dietsch was re-elected in District 7, and the board has two new directors—Michael Duffy in District 6 and Ronald Richards in District 8. Congratulations to them for being chosen to serve the membership for three years. A special thanks to the other candidates whose involvement is important to

the process. Members also approved changes to the co-op bylaws, adding details about director eligibility.

At the end of the meeting, we showed a short video and honored Stan Dybevik, retiring District 8 director, who has given so much to the cooperative during the past 40 years. That video tribute also is on YouTube.

Joining Stan at the meeting were his wife, Liz; son Tim; daughter Maria; daughter-in-law Katie; and grandson Joey. After the presentation, Stan said he appreciated that his family was in attendance for his last annual meeting as director. Family support was very important for directors in the early days when directors took outage calls. Although Stan is no longer a director, he remains a co-op member and has promised to attend future events.

As the co-op celebrates its 75 years and looks forward to another 75 years, I am deeply honored to be part of such an outstanding organization—an organization that truly impacts people's lives by empowering them with energy.
