

Make Sure To Watch For Farm Equipment This Spring

With planting season ramping up, more farm equipment will travel rural roads and highways. Motorists are encouraged to slow down, be alert and be patient when encountering farm machinery on roadways this spring.

While farm equipment can mean many different machines, generally in the spring it includes sprayers, tractors pulling planters or tillage equipment and trucks hauling agricultural products. With that in mind, Rock Energy would like to pass along to you some helpful driving safety tips for navigating rural roads this spring.

Safety tips for driving during planting season:

- **ALLOW EXTRA TIME:** Think about how long your trip will take and add extra time for busy farm roads.
- GIVE THEM ROOM: Give farmers plenty of room on the road. If a piece of equipment takes up the entire road, pull into a driveway or area and wait for them to pass.
- PASSING: When passing, be sure you do so in a passing zone and that there is clear visibility around farm equipment. Watch for oncoming vehicles.
- GO SLOW: Farmers in equipment move slowly, so cars going at or over the speed limit will catch up to farm machinery quickly. Please be patient and slow down.
 Do not assume that a farmer can move over in narrow areas; it is not always possible.



- MAKE THEM AWARE: Honk or motion when passing farmers, they may not know you are there.
- STAY BACK: Don't tailgate; it makes you hard to see.
- NO SUDDEN STOPS: Do not pass and then slow suddenly in front of equipment with implements behind it or farm trucks full of grain. They cannot stop quickly.
- **TURNS:** Farmers make very wide turns; give them plenty of time and room.



ARE YOU PREPARED FOR THE WARMER WEATHER?

CLEAN IT UP

Leaves, weeds and grass collect on the outdoor condenser unit during the fall and winter months, resulting in blocked air flow and reduced energy efficiency. Also, don't forget to change your air filter.



INSULATE

Adding easy-to-use blow-in insulation will reduce the amount of heat that flows from outdoors into the home, which will lower cooling costs and make the home more comfortable.

PROGRAMMABLE THERMOSTAT

Homeowners can get a jump start on the summer season by installing a smart thermostat. Smart thermostats can detect when home occupants are away and then automatically adjust to an energy-saving mode.

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE

Effective in March, residential electric rates will increase by approximately 3.5% or \$4 per month. This will be reflected on the billing statement that members receive in April. Many factors have led to an increase, such as: wholesale supplier's clean energy goals, supply chain constraints, world events, weather and inflation.
