Rock Energy Assists With Hurricane Relief Effort

Focused On Reliable Service Heading Into 2025

As we embark on this new year, Rock Energy is focused on providing you, our members, with reliable service all day, every day. With that said, in late September and into October last year, Hurricane Helene reminded everyone just how vulnerable the electric grid can be to the forces of strong wind and storm surge.


The catastrophic tropical cyclone produced a wide swath of damage and loss of life that extended from northwestern Florida, where the storm made landfall on September 26, 2024, to Tennessee, Georgia, and North Carolina. Helene's high winds and flooding took the lives of more than 230 people. Some estimates put the economic impact of the storm, including property and infrastructure damage, as high as \$200 billion, which would make Helene the costliest storm in U.S. history.

Two Rock Energy linemen joined numerous other Wisconsin crews to assist with storm recovery after Hurricane Helene left a vast amount of damage. Crews gathered at Rock Energy in Janesville before making the trek to Aiken Electric Cooperative in Aiken, South Carolina in early October. Overall, forty-five crew members from 15 Wisconsin electric cooperatives took part in the effort. The two Rock Energy linemen who participated were Bill Wright and Devin Sieling.

Fortunately, we don't have to worry about hurricanes in this area of the country; however, severe weather has been known to wreak havoc on our electric lines.

Obviously, we have no control over the weather, and we must accept the outages caused by severe weather when they occur. With that said, if an outage should happen, I assure you that we will do everything in our power to have service back up and running as quickly as possible.

A key component of WECA's educational programming for young people, the three-day Youth Leadership Conference (YLC) has been held each summer since 1964. The 2024, YLC attracted more than 60 students sponsored by 16 cooperatives. Activities focus on maximizing leadership potential, understanding cooperatives, and co-op governance—the students organize and operate a functioning cooperative during the event—effective communication, and turning mistakes into stepping stones for success.

Participating students elect a six-member WECA Youth Board who will help plan the following year's Youth Leadership Conference. The elected board will also have the opportunity to attend the NRECA Youth Tour and visit the WECA offices and State Capitol legislative offices. Another feature of the youth conference is the annual WECA Essay Contest. For the essay contest, students write on co-op oriented subjects, competing for three scholarships of \$1,000, \$500, and \$250, redeemable at any accredited post-secondary educational institution in the U.S.

YLC offers a head start in understanding cooperative business principles for the upcoming generation of co-op leaders.

Rock Energy Board Member Seated at WECA Annual Meeting

WECA hosted its 88th Annual Meeting at Glacier Canyon at the Wilderness Hotel in the Wisconsin Dells in November with a new president and CEO, Rob Richard, at the helm. As part of his speech, Richard honored the memory of former WECA president and CEO Steve Freese, who he called a mentor and a friend.

Richard emphasized that the "right of first refusal" (ROFR) legislation will again be the top priority of the next legislative session. Having a ROFR bill on the books will help keep members' rates down by ensuring incumbent utilities, such as Dairyland Power Cooperative, are able to compete for new high-transmission projects deemed necessary to ensure reliability for all in the region, and are therefore eligible for cost-sharing.

Also at the meeting, Rock Energy board member and vice chair Barbara Miller was seated as a WECA board member. Miller is also the vice chairperson for the WECA board.
